ATC also has a DOAC monitoring program that involves screening daily prescribing reports of 10-20 patients per day for appropriateness of drug, dosing, lab monitoring, drug interactions, and access to medication and is primarily a phone based service.

If an option, best patients to refer would include: patients that are non-adherent, on multiple (e.g., > 3) medications or high-cost medication (e.g., biologics), require close follow-up after medication initiation (e.g., psychostimulants, alpha-2 agonists), or need medication-specific education (e.g., inhaler devices, self- injectable medication).
